

Americas Society presents an exhibition dedicated to Alexander Von Humboldt (1769–1859), the Prussian scientist, diplomat, intellectual and explorer, who traveled through the Americas between 1799 and 1804 and became vastly influential among American artists and intelligentsia. Guest-curated by Alicia Lubowksi-Jahn and Georgia de Havenon, the exhibition explores Humboldt's legacy and includes an installation by contemporary ecological artist Mark Dion.
