



Centro Latinoamericano de Altos Estudios Musicales

Founded by Alberto Ginastera, the Centro Latinoamericano de Altos Estudios Musicales (CLAEM) of the Instituto Di Tella in Buenos Aires was a major meeting point for composers from all Latin America throughout the 1960s. CLAEM fellows Graciela Paraskevaídis, Mariano Etkin, and Jorge Sarmientos became three of the most important composers in the region. This concert, curated by Argentinean musicologist Laura Novoa, features experimental chamber music composed ca. 1966 by these three composers as well as the groundbreaking video En el Reino Helado de Flash Gordon.


